# It was a great day to replant a creek bed!

Thirty-one students from Shady Cove's 5<sup>th</sup> grade class got to work first hand in revitalizing Indian Creek in Aunt Caroline's Park. They assisted the City and the Rogue River Watershed Council along with volunteers from Southern Oregon Fly Fishers in planting native species along the creek bank on October 25. Their teacher, Heather Neely, kept them all working, learning, and having fun from the experience for hours.

The students worked most of the day on this project. They brought their lunches and started right away to dig in. It was an amazing sight to see all of their energy. Their teacher, Ms. Neely, seemed to have a magic whistle that brought them all together quickly and quietly.

The City received a grant from the Rogue River Watershed Council to fix up the eroding creek bank. The Watershed Council started by taking aerial photos over the creek to ascertain damage from the years of flooding. Then Spencer McMahan from the City and John Speece from the Watershed Council began the painstaking process of moving the eroding sections slightly to allow enough water to flow while keeping the bank stabilized. After all the work was completed the students did a final check of all their plantings.

*On the technical side* - Indian Creek is a seasonal stream, running east to west off Joe Dyer Butte through the City of Shady Cove. It traces the northern boundary to Aunt Caroline's Park, a 3.7 acre City park located on the corner of Highway 62 and Indian Creek Road. Indian Creek is a fish-bearing stream that historically supported populations of Coho Salmon, Summer and Winter Steelhead, Cutthroat Trout and Rainbow Trout.

Aunt Caroline's Park lies on Indian Creek and is approximately 800 feet upstream from the confluence with the Rogue River. The existing riparian corridor along the target reach (south bank) was shallow and void of shrubs and understory vegetation. To restore it to optimal functionality, a buffer of native vegetation needed to be planted. The plantings will be supported by irrigation and extend up to 50 feet from the natural vegetation line.

As a reward, Seth and Laura Goebel of Goebel's Country Store & BBQ treated the whole class to lunch the next week! The students said it was delish!

We would like to thank our volunteers Dave Grosjaques, Ken Heindsmann, Russ Leavitt, and the mothers of students, Jolene Herrera and Stephanie Hines.

The City of Shady Cove takes our hats off to the 5<sup>th</sup> grade students, teacher Heather Neely, Amy Isackson, Shady Cove School Principal for their diligence and dedication to the project. We will all benefit from their endeavor for generations to come.

## **EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS**

Two hundred fifty years ago when the first settlers began to arrive in Oregon from the East, the Rogue River was there. Eight thousand five hundred years ago when the first settlers began to arrive in Oregon from the West, the Rogue was there. We are, but temporary stewards of the Rogue and we must ask, "What will the Rogue be like at the end of the next 250 years, the next 250 years, the next 8,500 years?" We, the folks of Shady Cove, must have a vibrant dialogue about how we impact our river. We in Shady Cove are settled on only a small stretch of the Rogue's 215 mile length.

However, it is that opportunity to settle along the river that attracts most of our residents. Folks like the Rogue for its beauty, tranquility and utility as many as our residents derive their livelihood from their proximity to our river. As Shady Cove and Jackson County continue to grow we will demand more from the Rogue thus increasing the burdens our population places on the river.


The Rogue River is divided into eight sections for evaluation. The cleanliness index of our river ranges from 85 to 97 on a scale of 100. Two of the eight sections are rated as poor. Not only do we have to look at the river within its riparian corridor we have to look at the entire watershed which drains 5,156 square miles. Sixty percent of that area is managed by one of our federal agencies. Urban areas cover less than 1% of the area of the watershed. However, because of the beauty, economics and available water supply the urban areas are nestled along the banks of the Rogue or one of its tributaries.

In my lifetime I have watched a dramatic change in our attitudes about our aquatic landscapes. I was born and raised along the Hudson River about 150 miles north of New York City. In the mid to late 1950's an eight mile stretch of the Hudson, very near my home, was classified as the most heavily polluted body of water in the world. We witnessed the loss of entire industries, a decline in property values and a catastrophic drop in the personal enjoyment of the Hudson.

One outcome of that tragic situation was the creation of an academic field of study called Limnology—the study of fresh water aquatic systems in 1957. We have voluminous amounts of knowledge now that we did not have 75 years ago. We know what we need to study. We know what levels of tolerance are required to have a viable body of water. We know the burden can't be borne by a few, stewardship is a team sport.

What we do not know is-do we have the will?
